



Question 1: In what ways do you assist victims in obtaining housing?

- 100% responded that they provide DV shelter.
- 28% also provide transitional housing.
- 22% also provide homeless shelter.
- 13-16% also provide specific services related to public/other housing.




Participants were asked to specify if they selected other emergency housing or transitional housing. Below are some notable comments.

- The agency directly provides emergency housing in a dv shelter and works with a network of care providers to access all others that were checked.
- The YWCA Dayton provides emergency shelter and housing to women in a Safe Haven's program. The clients have been diagnosed with disabilities including mental health issues, and they are homeless.
- o 24 month transitional housing to DV survivors exiting shelter 6 units at scattered sites
- We operate a TH program for single adults. Victims of DV are given priority status for entry into it.


Question 2: In what ways do you provide housing advocacy for victims?

- 66% provide abuse certification.
- Majority of providers advocate for victims' housing in different ways.




Question 3: Do you work with local housing authorities in your service area?

• Majority of the providers work with local housing authorities.




Question 4: How would you describe your relationship with local housing authorities?

• Most of them describe their relationship as Excellent or Good.




Question 5: How many of your clients must go to homeless shelters yearly?

• For majority of providers, only 20 or less clients per year must go to homeless shelters. Without the number of actual households served per year by these providers, it is hard to estimate if this numbers is high or low. However, this number seems low considering the size of the participants (32).



Question 6: Does your shelter receive funds for housing homeless clients?

• Majority of them do NOT receive funds for housing homeless clients.
